

BENEFACTOR LOANS COOK'S JOURNALS

In January 2007 a set of Captain Cook's journals (first edition) goes on display. The nine volumes plus maps were published between 1773-1779 and give a detailed account of Cook's voyages. The set is the recent acquisition of Professor Jack Richards of Wainui. He secured the bound volumes after a successful bid of twenty-four thousand pounds in the Bloomsbury's Auctions in London. The volumes will be displayed in a purpose built case (also supplied by Professor Richards) at the entrance to Kahurangi (i.e. taonga wing). This is an important acquisition given Cook's association with this region. We are grateful to Professor Richards for allowing the museum to display the set.

Professor Richards has been a wonderful benefactor to the Tairāwhiti Museum over the past decade. Annually he provides \$20,000 for scholarships at Toi Houkura, Tairāwhiti Polytechnic. He contributes to the Museum's fine

arts collection via the Ruanuku award whereby he purchases an art piece from the top Toi Houkura student's work. He also randomly purchases artworks and offers them for the collection.

This year he funded the installation of a fine arts store room to keep the region's artworks under proper climatic storage conditions. And just this month he gave \$25,000 towards the replacement of carpets in the Museum's concourse and galleries.

Professor Richards also does his bit to raise the profile of arts and culture in our community. He is well known for bringing national and international classical performers to Gisborne and has sponsored their performances in the Lawson Field theatre or at his home in Wainui. He also supports touring art and culture shows (e.g. NZ Ballet Company through PAM) and numerous other art events.

TAONGA AUDIT GETS UNDERWAY

Moana Colmer is our newly appointed researcher carrying out a stocktake of the museum's Taonga Maori Collection. She has just completed a Postgraduate Diploma of Museum Studies at Massey University and passed with distinction.

My appointment at Tairāwhiti Museum allows me to work with the wonderful and diverse collection of Maori treasures housed within the Museum. I was very pleased to accept the position, which is funded by Te Puni Kokiri. I have always had a passion for history, anthropology, art and photography, with a view to working within the heritage sector, so this is a fantastic opportunity. I grew up on the Coromandel Peninsula, but I am of Waikato descent.

The audit project involves locating and recording physical information about each of the Museum's estimated 1,800 taonga, checking conservation standards, updating the collection management database and contacting the donors of loaned taonga. I will also be digitally photographing each individual taonga; from objects as small as a fine bone needle through to large wooden carvings. In fact some objects are so large they may need to be filmed!


The project is also about providing a high standard of care for the items and being able to use this superb resource more effectively. The museum hopes to publicly display a wider range of Maori treasures and thereby allow the community better access to the collection.

We are committed to stimulating passion for the stories of the Tairāwhiti region. Through this project the Museum will be better positioned to share the stories that these wonderful Taonga Maori can tell.

When the Friends of the Museum of Te Tairāwhiti Incorporated (Friends Inc.) was established on 15 October 1999 the primary objective was “to support and enhance the activities and operation of the Museum of Te Tairāwhiti”.

In 2004, through inactivity, Friends Inc. was struck off the Incorporated Societies Register. On 1 September 2006 a “think tank” group (which included among others Roger Honey, Gwenda Crawshaw and Margaret Mettner) applied to have the Friends Inc. restored and the request was granted. The “think tank” group then suggested a number of amendments to the Friends Inc. constitution with the assistance of the former Museum Board Chairman Michael Chrisp. A Special General Meeting was called on 14 November 2006 and the following people were elected to form the new Friends Inc. committee;

The constitution was also amended to correct a number of anomalies. An immediate Friends Inc. Committee Meeting was then convened to nominate two new Museum Board members to fill the vacancies created with the retirement of Michael Chrisp and the more recent resignation of Pam Bain. Michael Muir and Steve Hathaway were nominated and will very competently represent Friends Inc. on the Museum Board.

Friends Inc. will hold regular committee meetings at the Museum, on the first Tuesday of each month at 5.00pm, recommencing in February next year. Currently Friends Inc. has 189 members and

this seems to be growing in line with the projected target of 300 by the end of the financial year. However, the Friends Inc. Committee would still like to encourage everyone to get as many acquaintances, family, colleagues or business associates as possible to join us.

I would like to thank the Museum Director Dr. Monty Soutar, the Museum staff, Michael Chrisp and those members of the “think tank” who have assisted in restoring Friends Inc. On behalf of Friends Inc. can I extend our very best wishes for the festive season, a safe Happy Christmas and a restful New Year.

The following are some of the treasures added to the museum's collections in recent months:

- ☐ A map of the Native Reserve at Te Reinga, 1880. Simply found in a book by the donor.
- ☐ Photocopied Admission & Withdrawal Registers of Kokako School, 1897-1926
- ☐ 1940s Gisborne school uniform items. 1924 PBRU cap



- ☐ PhD thesis: The pioneering press of Poverty Bay 1872-1914
 - ☐ Some very important early 20thC memorabilia once the property of the late Chief Judge Robert Noble Jones
 - ☐ Items once given as complimentary gifts by former local businesses, with their names inscribed on them. A lasting memory that such a firm existed.
 - ☐ A Minutes Book and a Ledger, ranging from 1907 to 1926, of the former Motu Cooperative Saleyards Ltd. Saved from destruction by a whisker when a house was being cleared out.
- The museum is extremely grateful to all donors for remembering us before disposing of unwanted items!


Calling all Artists!
